ABOUT MUDLARK

Based in Launceston on the banks of Kanamaluka (Tamar) River, Mudlark is an artist-led theatre company committed to the production of authentic new Australian theatre that will inspire and challenge audiences and the next generation of regional theatre-makers.

Mudlark is a proud incubator of new Tasmanian theatre.

Our annual artistic program produces theatre of local resonance and universal significance. We welcome the responsibility of ensuring a diversity of stories and experiences on our stages, providing a platform for important, timely and provocative conversations, and seek to break down the boundaries that keep people off the stage and out of the audience.

Annually, we aim to present 2, mainstage productions and support the development

and delivery of a suite of other projects, providing employment and development opportunities to over 90 artists of all career stages. Our creative model ensures vital time and capacity to innovate new work; creating a space for ideas, writing and theatre-making that supports bold artistic vision and risk.

Mudlark is a proud In-House Organisation of Assembly 197, a nationally significant live arts centre; providing our company with a venue, shared resources and collegial support, and exciting possibilities for multi art form collaboration with our fellow resident companies such as the award-winning 2023 production of Big Heat.

In 2024 Mudlark welcomed company co-founder Jane Johnson back to the role of Artistic Director.

We consider it a privilege to support artists and the theatre ecology of Tasmania by producing significant new work for the stage.

Creating new work is the heartbeat of Mudlark Theatre. In 2025 Mudlark will reach the milestone of 20 years of proudly regional theatre-making in Lutruwita/Tasmania.

CO-WRITERS NOTES



Writing *The Box* with Nathan has been a real education for me. We started nearly two years ago, building the initial framework of the story in a small shed in Launceston with theatre maker. Maeve MacGregor.

A lot has changed within the story since then, but many detailed moments have remained from that first week. I've learned a great deal from this process and felt a weight lifted off my shoulders as I was sharing some thoughts and feelings about my life in this story. There was a lot of love in those writing sessions as we tackled some difficult subjects. I want to give a shout out to Nathan for setting the standard with care and encouragement. If you grew up in a neighbourhood like the fictional Bowandale, perhaps you knew people like those in this story or see a bit of yourself in them. With *The Box*, we aimed to shine a light on the hardships many people face while living in housing and how they often become an afterthought for the government.

I want to acknowledge my family and community in my home suburb of Clarendon Vale. To those who have shown love, kindness, and respect over the years, thank you.

I'm grateful that people will see our story, set in a place that is not often seen and amplifying voices that are rarely heard.

THE BOX

DURATION: 90 MINUTES NO INTERVAL

Set in a fictional housing commission suburb of Bowendale, the story of *The Box* draws us into the home and family of a single mother Mandy and her two hardened "Bowey boy" sons.

This story is a relentlessly real, daringly comic and profoundly moving theatre experience, uncovering the painful truths and actions that define one family's existence inside a government experiment.

A complex and compelling family drama, *The Box* rages at the fragility of our lives, lives balanced on a knife edge, revealing the courage it takes for many to persist and survive, let alone "dream outside the box".



Nathan, a Trawlwoolway man from Larapuna country. Lutruwita/ Tasmania, is a seasoned multidisciplinary artist with 25 years of experience. He has authored seven full-length plays, including The Season, At What Cost, A Not So Traditional Story, and Hide The Doa (co-written with Jamie Macaskill). Nathan's works have graced prestigious Australian stages such as the Sydney Opera House's Drama Theatre. Notably. he directed Journey of The Free Words at the 2019 Junction Festival, and helmed productions like Crumbs at Melbourne Art Play and Back on Track with Jute Theatre in 2022. He also assistant directed his play At What Cost at Belvoir Street Theatre the same year. Nathan's latest achievements include directing and co-writing Moonbird for SBS Digital Originals, and creating Mathinna's Doll for ABC's Stuff The British Stole



ROB Braslin

A proud Wakka Wakka, Rob is a man with a passion for storytelling. Rob started performing stand up comedy back in 2013 and it opened many different doors and sometimes small side windows within the arts that a kid from Clarendon Vale normally wouldn't get through; from writing for stage and screen to developing walking tours and art installations, Rob's unique perspective and storytelling abilities will continue to prosper as he leans into projects that challenge, inspire and educate him.



COREY SAYLOR-BRUNSKILL

Corey is a Lutruwita/ Tasmanian born Torres Strait Islander actor and is now based in Naarm/ Melbourne. Corey spent the first 12 years of his acting journey in Tasmania, studying with Second Story Youth Theatre, Launceston College, and UTAS, but longed for the mainland. Since moving to Australia's Big Apple, Corey has performed in the main stage productions Conversations with The Dead and Viral (Ilbiierri Theatre Company) as well as Whose Gonna' Love Em at Malthouse Theatre (2023), and recently had his first directing debut with Ilbijerri Theatre Co.
